Group Pantomime Performance

Task: In groups of 3-4 students, create a pantomime (no speaking!) performance that tells a complete story. The story must contain all five parts of plot and will be based randomly on story dice. This is a three-minute performance. **If this seems too difficult, one student may be a narrator. They can help describe the plot to the audience.*

Names of group members:

Example: My group rolls the story dice and got the following symbols: **a lock, a key, and a person sleeping**. We decide to create a scene where a person accidentally locks themselves in a room and can't find the key (*exposition*). He tries to wake up someone sleeping outside the door, then another person comes and tries to break down the door (*rising action*). Finally, the person locked in finds the key in his pocket (*climax*). He opens the door and the other characters scold him for being forgetful (*falling action*). They laugh and walk off stage together (*resolution*).

 Pick: Roll the 9 story dice and write your symbols below. Circle the 3 symbols you want to use in your performance. Be creative when interpreting these symbols, they are to help you think of an interesting scene.
*Spend your time preparing the performance rather than choosing the symbols.

Think carefully about each action YOU must perform. Are your movements very clear and obvious to the audience? Remember if your actions aren't believable, then the group's performance won't be either. Practice the scene (from beginning to end) MANY times.

4. **Present**: When it is your time to present, turn in your planning sheet and walk on stage. Begin with your introduction, take a deep breath, and then start your performance. Take your time and give full attention to each step and detail. If you are focused and concentrated, the audience will believe you. When finished, pause for a moment and take a bow!
